

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Annual Drinking Water Quality Report

Harwood, North Dakota

2017

We're very pleased to provide you with this year's *Annual Drinking Water Quality Report*. We want to keep you informed about the excellent water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. Our water source is ground water from the West Fargo Aquifer. We have a water treatment/storage plant, and two 200' deep wells. The water plant has detection, aeration, and iron & manganese removal filtration system.

The City of Harwood is participating in North Dakota's Wellhead Protection Program. A copy of this program is available upon request. The North Dakota Department of Health has prepared a Source Water Assessment for Harwood. Information regarding this program is also available upon request.

Our public water system, in cooperation with the North Dakota Department of Health, has completed the delineation and contaminant/land use inventory elements of the North Dakota Source Water Protection Program. Based on the information from these elements, the North Dakota Department of Health has determined that our source water is "not likely susceptible" to potential contaminants.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Bernie Stasch, Water Works Superintendent at 701-281-0314. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled meetings. They are held on the first Monday of every month at 7:00 pm at the City Hall. If you are aware of non-English speaking individuals who need help with the appropriate language translations, please call Bernie at the number listed above.

The City of Harwood would appreciate it if large volume water customers would please post copies of the *Annual Drinking Water Quality Report* in conspicuous locations or distribute them to tenants, residents, patients, students, and/or employees, so individuals who consume the water, but do not receive a water bill, can learn about our water system.

The City of Harwood routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The following table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2017. As authorized and approved by EPA, the state has reduced monitoring requirements for certain contaminants to less often than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. Some of our data [e.g., for inorganic contaminants], though representative, is more than one year old.

The sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land, or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) prescribes regulations, which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

In the following tables you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Not Applicable (NA)

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (µg/l)- one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/l) - picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

Action Level (AL)- the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Treatment Technique (TT) - A treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Maximum Contaminant Level - The "Maximum Allowed" (*MCL*) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal - The "Goal" (*MCLG*) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

*If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant woman and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The City of Harwood is responsible for providing high quality drinking water but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. **Use water from the cold tap for drinking and cooking. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking.** If you are concerned about lead in your drinking water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize expo-sure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>.

EPA requires monitoring of over 80 drinking water contaminants. Those contaminants listed in the table above are the only contaminants detected in your drinking water.

Unregulated contaminants are those for which EPA has not established drinking water standards. The purpose of unregulated contaminant monitoring is to assist EPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water and whether future regulation is warranted.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791).

MCL's are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated contaminants, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect.

Thank you for allowing us to provide your family with clean, quality water this year. In order to maintain a safe and dependable water supply we sometimes need to make improvements that will benefit all of our customers. These improvements sometimes require rate structure adjustments.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons, such as, persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791).

Top 10 Fun Facts About Water

1. Roughly 70 percent of an adult's body is made up of water.
2. At birth, water accounts for approximately 80 percent of an infant's body weight.
3. A healthy person can drink about three gallons (48 cups) of water per day.
4. Drinking too much water too quickly can lead to water intoxication. Water intoxication occurs when water dilutes the sodium level in the bloodstream and causes an imbalance of water in the brain.
5. Water intoxication is most likely to occur during periods of intense athletic performance.
6. While the daily recommended amount of water is eight cups per day, not all of this water must be consumed in the liquid form. Nearly every food or drink item provides some water to the body.
7. Soft drinks, coffee, and tea, while made up almost entirely of water, also contain caffeine. Caffeine can act as a mild diuretic, preventing water from traveling to necessary locations in the body.
8. Pure water (solely hydrogen and oxygen atoms) has a neutral pH of 7, which is neither acidic nor basic.
9. Water dissolves more substances than any other liquid. Wherever it travels, water carries chemicals, minerals and nutrients with it.
10. Somewhere between 70 and 75 percent of the earth's surface is covered with water.

Law Enforcement Report: Deputy Glenn Manning presented the monthly Adopt-A-Community report for April. For April, there were 3 traffic related incidents, 5 animal calls, 2 suspicious activity calls, 1 found property.

Old Business:

Fireworks: Mike Kvanvig attended the meeting to discuss the final details of selling fireworks at the Harwood Community Center. Kvanvig will pay the City of Harwood \$2000 for rent, plus \$1678 for building insurance. Kvanvig will also provide liability insurance for his product.

New Business:

Building Permits: Three building permits were presented to the Harwood City Council. Permits 751, 752, and 753 were submitted. Sundberg made a motion to approve permit 751, seconded by Jury. All in favor voted aye, and the motion passed. Sundberg made a motion to approve permit 752, seconded by Meyer. All in favor voted aye, and the motion passed. Permit 753 was rejected until the floodplain elevation for the project is submitted.

Special Event Permits: Two weddings are taking place in June that require a special event permit to host the Harwood Grill & Saloon bar at the Community Center. The weddings for Allen Irish and Josh Akers both had permits submitted for approval. Meyer made a motion to approve the permits, seconded by Jury. All in favor voted aye, and the motion carried.

Estimate for Flooring in Community Center Bathrooms and Estimate for Foundation: Meyer relayed the estimates for repairing both the Community Center bathroom floors, as well as the foundation on the north side of the Community Center.

Security for the Community Center Events: Meyer relayed that there was a miscommunication for events held at the Community Center. One of the wedding parties in June relayed that they hired their own security company, and did not realize that the City would book security for them. ASP Security out of Moorhead, MN is generally the company that the City of Harwood hires for events, and the wedding party hired a different security company for the event, causing ASP Security to feel disregarded. The consensus of the board was to regard this situation as a miscommunication, and to move forward, seeing as there is no signed contract that legally binds the City of Harwood to solely use ASP Security.

Public Works Report: Stasch reported that the Water Plant Open House went really well. The Harwood Elementary school students visited the plant during the day, and 23 adults visited the plant in the late afternoon and early evening.

Engineer's Report: Aakre discussed that on June 20th there would be a CBDG meeting that he will be attending for the upcoming sewer project. Hughes volunteered to attend the meeting as well.

Auditor's Report: Eggermont discussed attending the upcoming CRS training in Bismarck, and working on the 2019 budget. She asked when the council would like to have a special meeting to go over the entire budget, and the consensus is to have a special meeting on July 23rd.

Correspondence:

Railroad Crossing on Dakota Avenue: Kathy Jorgenson attended the meeting briefly to discuss her disgust with the railroad crossing on Dakota Avenue. She said that since the railroad had done work to the crossing earlier this year that the crossing is much rougher, and that it never used to be that way. Stasch said that he would make a few phone calls to see who can fix the crossing.

Portfolio Reports:

Rohrich: Mayor Rohrich relayed that he talked with Tom Stennes at the Harwood State Bank about a possible loan for purchasing the Tanner residence, and that Stennes relayed that he would work with the City for a loan.

Adjourn: Motion to adjourn by Jury, seconded by Sundberg. All in favor voted aye, and the meeting was adjourned at 8:59pm.



Chicken Salad with Grapes

- 3 c. cooked and diced leftover chicken (this is also approximately how much one deli rotisserie chicken yields)
 - 1 c. red seedless grapes, halved
 - 2 ribs of celery, chopped
 - 1 Tbsp. onion powder
 - 1 tsp. seasoned salt (We use Lawry's)
 - ½ c. mayonnaise (give or take - depending how creamy you like your salad)
1. Cook your chicken using whatever method you prefer - or, do what I do and grab a rotisserie chicken from the deli and use all that meat. Dice it up.
 2. Wash your grapes and celery, halve the grapes and dice the celery. Stir them into your diced chicken and set this all aside.
 3. Mix the onion powder and seasoned salt into the mayo really well, then stir in your chicken mixture.
 4. Chill until ready to serve, then add to croissant rolls. For parties and pot lucks, I like to serve on mini croissants. For each batch, you'll need 12 mini croissants or 6 regular sized croissants
